

Sermon Themes for October

October 4

Someone Has to Pay For the Roof

Mark 2.1-12

Jesus healed a bed-ridden man who was let down through the roof of a home because there were too many people jamming around the front door. The man's friends cut a hole in the roof to lower him into the room where Jesus healed him. Think about the owner of the house. When all the commotion died down, when all the people had gone home, when the dishes were put away and the house was put back in order, the homeowner still had a hole in his roof. Question: Who's going to pay for the roof? There's always a cost to fulfilling our mission, loving others, getting involved. Are we willing to pay it?

October 11

You Should Have Heard Them Sing

Acts 16.20-24

Sometimes we get ambushed in life by something we wish had never happened and we're never the same after it happens. God allowed something unpleasant to happen to Paul and Silas in Philippi, they were thrown into prison. But in the midst of their pain, they began to sing. As they sang, something happened to the other prisoners and the guards. An earthquake opened all the prison doors but no one ran away. The Roman guard fell on his knees in gratitude... and his whole family became followers of Jesus. From that beginning the church in Philippi was born.

October 18

A New Twist on an Old Parable

Matthew 25.14-30

Jesus respected the power of money and knew that we could easily be possessed by our possessions. He said that the depths of our joy could never be measured by the size of our bank account. It was the poor widow who gave her half-cent who was his hero. It was the penniless woman pounding at the door asking for bread who received his praise. It was the woman who had spent everything to find a cure and was still sick who was blessed when she touched his garment. Let's reflect together on how and why God might be blessing our church for mission and ministry in 2016.

October 25

Planting Seeds, Harvesting Abundance

I Corinthians 3.1-9

Our church is always planting seeds in peoples' lives. We may not be here to see the harvest, but someone someday will see it. And they'll trace that harvest of abundance back to this church, your prayer, your words of encouragement, your life and faith and the ways in which you inspired them. God is the gardener, the one who makes our efforts grow into a beautiful garden of justice, righteousness, compassion, acceptance and caring. We are God's garden, intended for the blessing and nourishment of many in our community and world.

November 1

Living With Leftovers

Mark 6.30-44

Feeding thousands of people with a few fish and pieces of bread was an amazing miracle. But maybe the deeper miracle is what happened when everyone had eaten their fill. Jesus told his disciples to gather the leftovers, the bits and pieces of bread that we might consider useless and only worth throwing away. Sometimes in life, we can feel like a pile of leftover crumbs as we grow tired and depleted spiritually, emotionally, mentally and physically. But Jesus never wastes what he has blessed. Somehow, Jesus uses even our weakness to touch and bless the lives of others.

THINKING OUT LOUD......

In order for the lame man to be healed, he needed four friends to carry him up to the roof of a house so crowded that no one could get in. Jesus was the guest of honor. There was no way the lame man could get close enough to catch Jesus' attention. The front door was blocked with people.

The four friends had a plan. They would take their friend up to the roof and make a hole in the roof big enough to lower the poor guy into the house.

I can just see the boards and straw and dust falling down on the heads of everybody in the house. The man's bed was lowered into the room – and everyone watches to see what will happen next. The crowd is primed to see a miracle. It happens! The man is healed by Jesus and leaves the house carrying his bed.

Here's my question: Who paid for the roof? The homeowner had a big hole in the ceiling. How did he deal with that? Did he pay for the repair? Did the four friends? The man who was healed? Jesus?

Good question. For God's work to get done.... somebody has to pay for the roof. Are we willing? Our budget says a lot about what we're willing to do in order to fulfill our mission. Loving others in Christ's name can be expensive. There's our physical plant, the building and grounds that consumes quite a lot of our resources. The usual costs of utilities, supplies, insurance, repairs and cleaning all soak up some of our resources. There's the staff to pay, Pastor, Organist, Administrative Assistant. There's our direct giving to mission – that often gets what's left over...help for the homeless and hungry, support for the marginalized and victimized of our community, giving for the national offerings, donations to individuals and groups that seek our financial help.

God's work is rooted in a vibrant and muscular love that is not sentimental or syrupy. Counting the cost for the love God calls us to live out through our church Ohana means hard work and sometimes disappointment. It may include getting angry at injustice and standing against the dominant powers that be in order to be true to our beliefs and calling.

In order for the lame man to be healed, he needed four bold friends who weren't afraid to tear apart a roof and lower him into Jesus' presence. But in the end, somebody had to pay for the roof. That's what our church budget is about....


Did You Know...



HERE'S WHAT'S HAPPENING IN THE COUNCIL KORNER

- The 2016 Church Budget has been approved by the Church Council. Thank you to everyone on the Budget Committee and to Chris Oda for taking on this big task.
- A Stewardship Letter to the Members with an attached overview of the 2016 Budget will be mailed the week of 10/18/15.
